Focus on Reading EY & KS1

Hello,

KS1 & EYFS English Focus - We love books!!!!!! #getpagetreading

This week we have seen the children move to their new RWI groups and we hope you are as pleased as we are with your child's progress. Within their groups they will continue to learn or embed their sounds and applying these to help them read new words and texts. In addition, they will also be developing their written skills through "hold a sentence" and "big writes".

For this newsletter I would like to focus on the Government Phonics Screening Check (**PSC**).

What is the Year 1 phonics screening check?

This is a way for us to check, alongside the RWI information we hold, that your child is making sufficient progress with their phonics skills to read words and that they are on track to becoming a fluent reader who can enjoy reading for pleasure and for learning.

The phonics screening check is taken individually by all children in Year 1 and for those children in Year 2 who need further support.

What is in the phonics screening check?

There are two sections in the 40-word check, and it assesses phonics skills and knowledge learned through Reception and Year 1. Your child will read up to four words per page to myself and they will probably do the check in one sitting of about 5-10 minutes.

What sort of check is it and is it compulsory?

It is a school-based check to make sure that your child receives any additional support promptly, should they need it. It is not a stressful situation as I will be well-equipped to listen and understand your child's level of skills and your child is used to doing these types of assessments with me. To build your child's confidence I will work with your child on a few practice words first to make sure your child understands the activity.

Focus on Reading: EY & KS1 (Continued)

What does it check?

It checks that your child can:

- Sound out and blend graphemes in order to read simple words.
- Read phonically decodable one-syllable and two-syllable words, e.g., cat, sand, windmill.
- Read a selection of nonsense words which are referred to as pseudo words.

What are nonsense or pseudo words and why are they included?

These are words that are phonically decodable but are not actual words with an associated meaning e.g., brip, snorb. Pseudo words are included in the check specifically to assess whether your child can decode a word using phonics skills and not their memory.

The pseudo words will be shown to your child with a picture of a monster, and they will be asked to tell their teacher what sort of monster it is by reading the word. This not only makes the check a bit more fun but provides the children with a context for the nonsense word which is independent from any existing vocabulary they may have. Crucially, it does not provide any clues, so your child just has to be able to decode it. Children generally find nonsense amusing so they will probably enjoy reading these words.



How will my child be scored? Is there a pass mark?

The check is not about passing or failing but checking appropriate progress is being made. If children do not reach the required standard, then the teacher will be in touch to discuss plans and offer additional, tailored support to ensure that your child can catch up. Children progress at different speeds so not reaching the threshold score does not necessarily mean there is a serious problem. Your child will re-sit the check the following summer term.

For the last few years, the threshold mark (or pass standard) set by the government has been 32 correct answers out of 40.

What happens to the results?

We will report your child's results to you by the end of the summer term as well as to the local authority, but the results won't be published in a league table as with SATs. If you have any concerns, do talk to your teacher about this in a parents' meeting or after school.

Focus on Reading: EY & KS1 (Continued)

Do all schools and children have to participate?

All schools and academies in England must take part in the phonics screening check unless they are an independent school. There is a process in place for reviewing children with special educational needs, so if we feel there are very special reasons related to your child and their needs that make us think the phonics screening check may not be appropriate, we will decide on appropriate action and discuss this with you.

What can I do to help my child?

I will be sending home or emailing to you sounds that we feel your child needs further help with. This will be a link to the Ruth Miskin Portal where your child will be able to watch and be involved with a speed sound lesson related to that sound. Look out for these over the next week.

What should I do if my child is struggling to decode a word?

- Say each sound in the word from left to right.
- Blend the sounds by pointing to each letter, i.e., /b/ in bat, or letter group, i.e., /igh/ in sigh, as you say the sound, then run your finger under the whole word as you say it.
- Talk about the meaning if your child does not understand the word they have read.
- Work at your child's pace.
- Always be positive and give lots of praise and encouragement.

SPOTLIGHT ON CURRICULUM: R.E.

Since September last year, we have managed to return to a full calendar of key stage assemblies, themed around our core values and themes within the RE curriculum.

We strongly believe that collective worship is important in school as it offers the change for pupils to explore and appreciate the values that are at the centre of our school ethos. We expect and teach pupils the importance of forgiveness, fairness and respect and timetabled collective worships provides all pupils the opportunity to understand and reflect on these values.

At Paget we see school worship as an educational opportunity with clear outcomes. The purpose of our assemblies is to encourage pupils to:

- · Show interest in, and a concern for, members of the school community
- · Celebrate special occasions together
- · Show concern for the daily happenings in school life, the local community, the wider world by celebrating the successes and sharing the disappointments
- · Share appreciation of worthwhile projects undertaken by groups within the school
- · Explore and review the variety of values, attitudes, standards, manifested in religions and society
- · Reflect upon dimensions of human life the wonderful, beautiful, joyful, heroic, humorous, tragic, sorrowful, solemn.

Collective Worship is delivered and makes connections with other curriculum subjects – music, art, English and drama. Providing pupils an opportunity to participate in inclusive discussions, share views and hear stories from other faiths, points of view and people within our community.

Our RE curriculum uses and follows key dispositions within Birmingham's agreed syllabus. These key dispositions allow the children to share their own experiences, beliefs, views and learn from others too. Paget pupils are encouraged to question their understanding and explore each of these themes in a range of ways, from class discussions, first-hand accounts, religious texts and stories. Children will revisit each of these dispositions, as they progress through each key stage. For example, being thankful begins with an understanding of when we say thank you in KS1 to a year 6 pupil having a deeper understanding and questioning skills to confidently explore and appreciate how other religions and belief systems give thanks.

By teaching and exploring these concepts, we aim all Paget children to have an understanding and appreciation of all views, beliefs and religions. The link may be useful, if you would like to share any additional information or resources with your child.



SPOTLIGHT ON SAFEGUARDING: ONLINE SAFETY

Being unkind online

It can be very easy online for children to behave in a way that they wouldn't if they were face to face with each other. Talk to your child about how they speak to others online and encourage them to talk to people online with respect and kindness, like they would if they were face-to-face.

How they act online should be how they behave on the school playground when they are following school rules.
