# Spotlight on Safeguarding: Keeping Children safe in the Dark

As the clocks go back and the nights draw in, it is an overnight adjustment for all of us keeping children safe in the dark. The darker evenings can have a big impact. However, our routines of picking up children from playdates or afterschool clubs, cycling home from work or taking the dog out for a walk all continue. These common daily activities can be very different experiences in the dark.

Follow these simple steps to stay safe wherever you are going and whoever you are with, to help avoid the additional risks of accidents the dark can bring.

**Visibility** is key here. Children need to be seen, not just by other motorists and cyclists, but by other pedestrians. It is vital to teach your children good road safety basics from an early age. Explain to children why they should not run across the road, show them how to identify safe places to cross and reinforce the importance of road safety. It is unsafe for young children to run ahead from their accompanying adult, or to whizz past on their scooters. Drivers may not spot a child on their own.

Encourage children to retain a sense of awareness. They should be discouraged from having headphones in their ears and should not be concentrating on their phones. Being pre-occupied and distracted will make them more vulnerable, both to being robbed or hit by a car.

Hold their hand on dark nights - It is good advice to always hold little one's hands especially near roads. Be prepared if something scares them and they panic and run.

**Visibility on dark nights -** Think about what your child is wearing. Some clothing is dark. They are safer if they are visible, and you can easily add high-visibility reflective strips on their clothing, school bags or bike helmets. Additionally, they could carry a torch.

**Be aware** - As any parent knows it can be very difficult to get a child to part from their mobile phone. Whether they are talking to friends or listening to music on their mobile, they can be distracted. As a result, they are less aware of dangers in their surroundings such as other people or traffic. Furthermore, the dark conditions increase the risk of danger. If your child insists on wearing their headphones, encourage them to opt for the ear bud types and ideally only use one side. Often teenagers walk in packs and are chatting and showing off and simply not paying attention. Sadly, it is often on these occasions that accidents can occur.

#### So, what is the Rule of Law?

The rule of law applies to very single member of British Society and visitors are expected to follow suit. There are not different rules for different parts of society or economic class. No one is above the law. Whoever they are.

Examples of rule of law include:

- Agreed ways of working, policies, and procedures. These could be formal or informal ways of working.
- · How the law protects you and others. Continually being reviewed.
- · Codes of conduct. In every walk of life.

The structure of modern British Society is based on following rules of law ensuring that everyone is safe and secure in this country.

All organisations operate on rules, policies, and procedures.


The Rule of Law is evident in every part of school life. Children are taught the value, importance, and reasoning behind why rules exist. There are lots of opportunities throughout all age groups
